Calendar year 2008 was a year of transition for the Chico Fire Department. Longtime Fire Chief Steve Brown retired from the City of Chico Fire Department after 13 years, and a total of 44 years in the fire service throughout the State. The department welcomed Fire Chief James Beery on July 21, 2008. Chief Beery arrived to Chico from the Portland Fire & Rescue Bureau in Oregon. The ongoing economic problems facing the City resulted in the loss of one firefighter on each shift. As a result, the department increased the staffing on Truck Company #1 from two to three firefighters each shift, and Truck Company #5 is now cross-staffed by the firefighters on Engine Company #5. The firefighter position that was eliminated from each shift is now used to fill vacancies that occur due to vacation, sick leave, etc.

Chico Fire Department personnel, equipment and apparatus were deployed throughout the State to numerous fires, including the largest fire emergency in Butte County history. The City of Chico received over \$1,000,000 dollars in reimbursement for deploying these resources to the fires.

All Chico Fire Department Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) were re-certified through California State Fire Training. All EMTs were also certified to use a CombiTube®, an advanced airway management device that improves patient survivability.

To meet a Federal mandate, all Chico Fire Department personnel were certified in National Incident Management System IS-800. The Fire Department facilitated the training of City Management personnel who staff the City of Chico Emergency Operations Center during an emergency.

The City of Chico 911 Safety Pals presented an internationally recognized fire and life safety education program to public and private elementary schools within the Chico city limits.

All cotton-jacketed fire hose was upgraded to synthetic, which is lighter, easier to use and requires less maintenance.

All firefighters received at least 240 hours of department training. This includes training on emergency medical services, hazardous materials response and mitigation, aircraft, structural and wildland firefighting, rescue, swift-water, etc.

ARFF (Aircraft Rescue Fire Fighter) Annual recertification was completed for fifteen fire fighters. This training is mandated by the FAA for all airports with commercial airline flights.

Emergency incidents continue to increase at a pace nearly double the population growth of the city. Emergencies increased nearly 6.5% from 2007 to 2008 across all response categories. Department members were again frequently requested to assist state and federal wildland firefighting agencies throughout California and the west.

All members of the Chico Fire Department hope that you will take fire prevention and life safety seriously and have a safe and prosperous year.

Our Mission is to provide the highest quality fire, rescue and emergency services to the Chico Community in a caring and professional manner.

1. To mitigate hazards and emergencies by rapidly responding to all requests for service with professional skills.

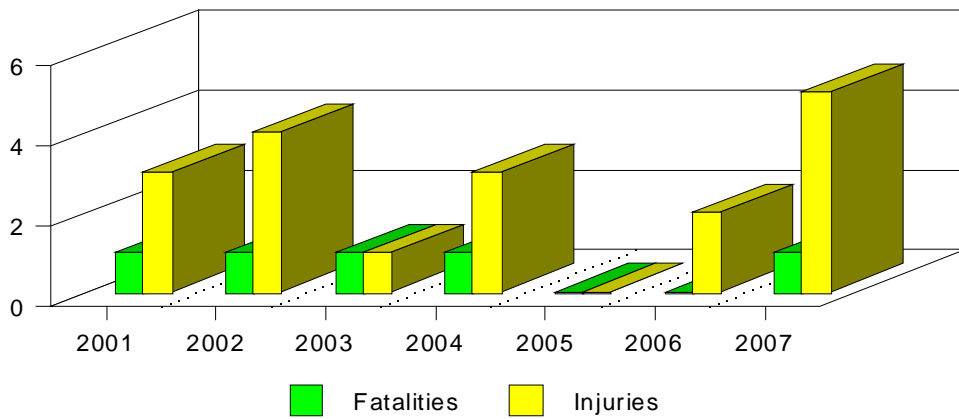

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RESPONSE TIMES

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the Insurance Services Office (ISO) recommend a response time standard of 30 seconds to dispatch the call, 60 seconds get away time, and 4 minutes driving time from the fire station to the emergency for a total response time of not more than 5 minutes and 30 seconds. This covers the time from receipt of call until the first response unit arrives at the emergency. They recommend that this standard be met at least 90% of the time. This applies specifically to structure fires. The City General Plan calls for an average response time of 4 minutes throughout the city.

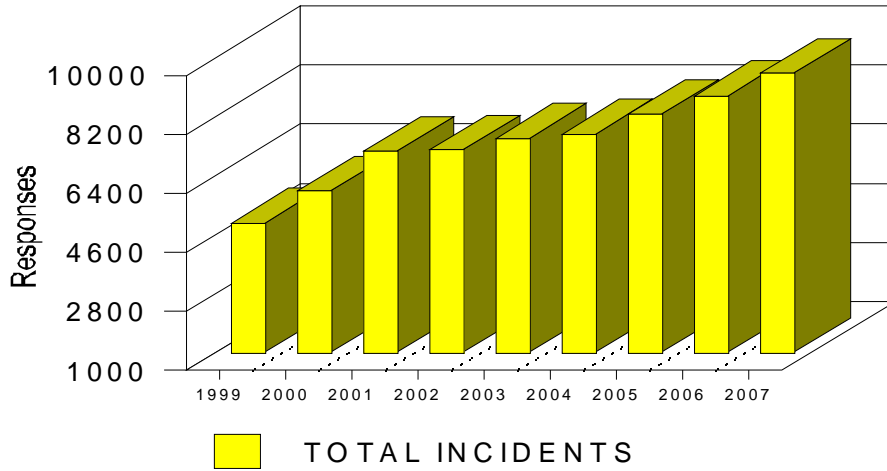
